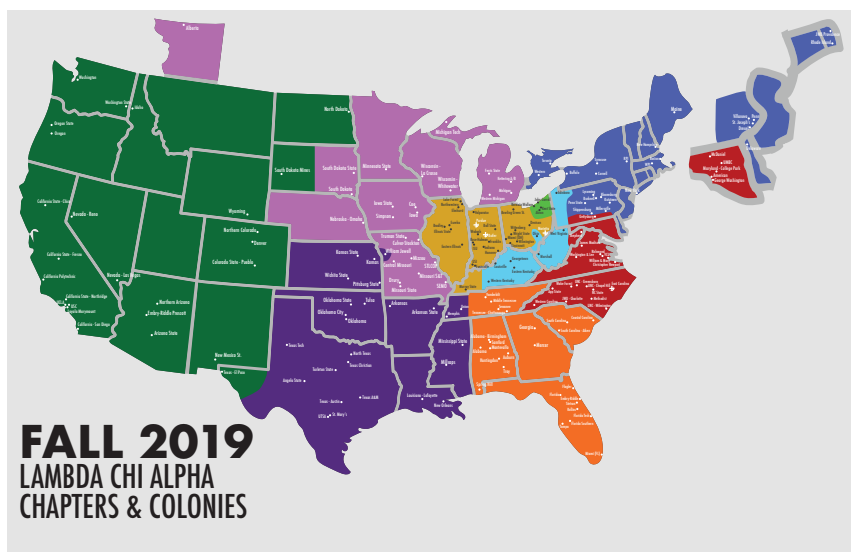

WORTH FIGHTING FOR:

IOTA-SIGMA ZETA'S JOURNEY TOWARD FINDING A CURE

For cancer patients, a pivotal moment in their journey toward health is the choice to shave their head upon accepting radiation treatment. Some choose a silent ceremony while others make a point to allow their friends and family to be involved by sharing on personal social channels. Loved ones occasionally join by removing their head full of hair in solidarity. At Valparaiso University, Iota-Sigma Zeta brothers used that symbolism to create the largest fraternal event on campus.

Lambda Chi Alpha's history with St. Baldricks Foundation encouraged the chapter to explore the way supporting the organization connects with their personal vision for philanthropy. The High Theta at the time, Jacob Landgraf (Iota-Sigma, '19), began to understand how deeply St. Baldricks Foundation impacted his brothers. Upon further research, he discovered that an alumnus brother had been diagnosed with cancer during his undergraduate career. After hearing that one of their own was directly affected by the cause, Landgraf dove head first.

"I think the big reason why people join Fraternities and Sororities is to give back. There's no better way of doing that than sharing your time and sharing your resources. I was very happy to volunteer my head for a child in need. That was something I wanted out of my Fraternity experience and events like that show we value Service and Stewardship, one of the seven core values" says Landgraf.

Volunteering his time is one thing, but his head is another. St. Baldricks Foundation is dedicated to raising money toward cancer research for kids and created a chain of nationwide events to fundraise. Individuals can create their own head shaving event with the help of St. Baldricks Foundation to make a direct impact. While many of the events offer food and games, the main goal is to raise money for cancer research through shaving participants' heads.

WHERE TO BEGIN

Although Landgraf's passion for St. Baldricks Foundation was fueled by his lifelong brotherhood, other organizations on campus began the partnership at Valparaiso University. He learned that the event trickled down and the remaining materials were hidden in a corner on campus. Once Landgraf was able to obtain those, he began to understand how Iota-Sigma Zeta could make the event a success.

With his heart fully invested in the project, Landgraf sought out a St. Baldricks Foundation Special Events staff member to show him the ropes. Through various trainings and call outs for committee members, he was able to confront the task with ease knowing dedicated brothers and friends were enthusiastic about the revitalization of a St. Baldricks Foundation event.

"I wanted to make sure it was successful because I've never created an event that size before. I recruited seven advisors for a St. Baldricks committee, a couple people who work in residence life and people who work in the union. I also recruited seven brothers to serve on the committee and they each specialized in one area" explains Landgraf.

He explains that the main reason for forming a large committee was to create a space for younger members to experience leadership. Before he was elected

into the High Zeta, Landgraf saw a breach in the marketplace that newly initiated members could fill.

"I really wanted that committee to be the minor league system for the High Zeta. What's great about St. Baldricks and the way we organized it is that it provided a lot of chances for members of the chapter, particularly freshman and sophomores, to cut their teeth on professional communication and working with different departments across the university. They see exact results in a way that really prepares younger brothers well for serving on the High Zeta" explains Landgraf.

One of the committee members, Brendan Godsel, served in community engagement during his first year of involvement. His role was to encourage local establishments to donate their time and resources for the event. Restaurants like Dominoes and Culvers offer to provide food for the guests while Jimmy Johns sponsors cards for the raffle each year.

In addition to a raffle, the Landgraf saw it necessary to have a St. Baldricks kid represent the organization by coming to the fundraiser. Their family shares a short message about the impact St. Baldricks Foundation has on their life and why the head shaving events are important for inclusivity.

CRUNCH TIME

By the spring of 2017, the event was beginning to take shape. When the High Zeta returned in the fall of 2017, Landgraf wasted no time by scheduling a weekly meeting to touch base. In two months, hundreds of individuals would come to the Valparaiso campus to support Iota-Sigma Zeta in their pursuit for cancer research.

The days grew long, and the nights became shorter as the event transitioned from weeks to days away. Landgraf began finalizing attendee numbers and ensuring the weather forecast did show signs of surprises. The night before, each member of the committee found ease in knowing that their hard work would come to fruition in a matter of hours.

Hundreds of people began to gather onto Valparaiso's campus to support Iota-Sigma in conjunction with St. Baldricks Foundation. Through the work of the committee members, more than enough entertainment and refreshments were prepared. From local pizza eateries donating their supply to barbers in the area working for free, the event gathered 300 people looking to be a part of something bigger than themselves.

"We had great participation from our faculty & staff. We were very good at recruiting people who didn't traditionally participate in fraternity and sorority fundraisers. Luckily, we had quite a few professors who have a history of supporting St. Baldricks Foundation, so they were instrumental in getting those fundraising dollars up" explains Landgraf.

One by one, students and faculty line up to willingly shave their heads in the name of cancer research. 50 faculty & staff, parents, students and brothers entered the stage to symbolize their support for St. Baldricks Foundation. Each participant reflects on the required 50-dollar fundraising fee that members of the crowd helped raise. Now, they got to witness what true partners in this fight look like.

"I've shaved my head twice before. We try to get guys in the chapter involved, as many as possible. The whole room cheers for you while you are getting

shaved to baldness. It feels great to be showing that you are helping. To have a way to show that you were a part of this is really cool" explains Godsel.

The barbers agreed to make the event more exciting by participating in a speed shave round. Selected participants group on stage at once to see which barber can shave their client's hair the fastest. The winning shavee picked up their fallen hair in victory of the ones who financially contributed to their victory.

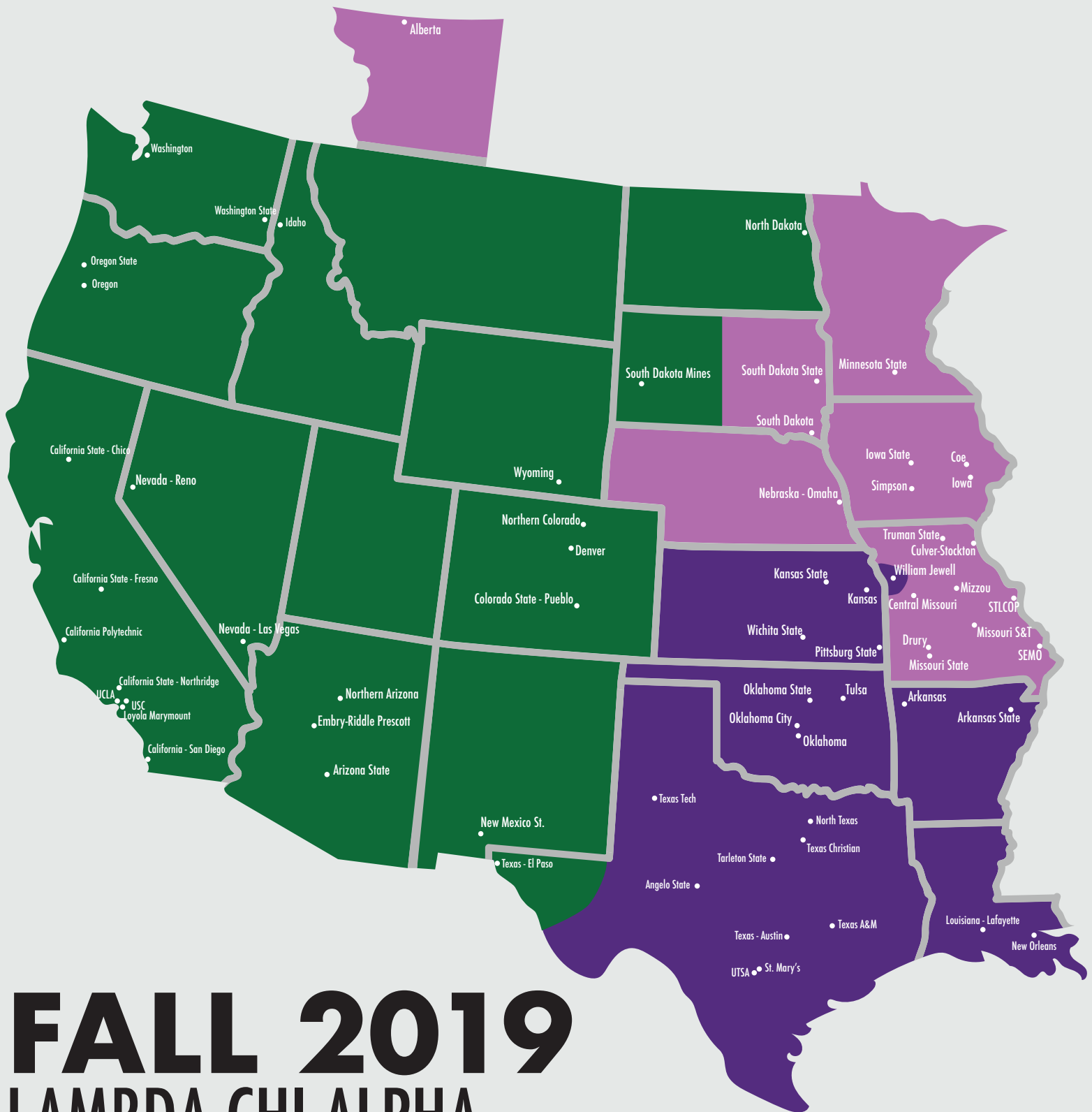
After it was said and done, the team took time to rest and recover before hearing news that would validate their commitment to St. Baldricks Foundation. Iota-Sigma Zeta was awarded the Valparaiso Fraternity/Sorority Award for Community Service and #1 Chapter Philanthropy Event.

In their first year, the chapter raised over 25,000 dollars to go directly back to funding St. Baldricks Foundation. Now that it has become their primary philanthropy event for the year, the current High Theta, Ulises Hernandez, plans to continue their success streak through his passion for finding a cure.

"We just want to let everyone know that we are working very hard to help end this disease that affects thousands of families nationwide. We are aware of the cost that it takes to fund this type of research and we want to contribute even if it's a very small amount" says Hernandez.

Now that he has graduated and moving to Indianapolis to begin his career, Landgraf feels honored to have spearheaded the next step in Iota-Sigma's journey toward philanthropy. He created a framework that he hopes smaller chapters will emulate in their pursuit for funding cancer research & treatment.

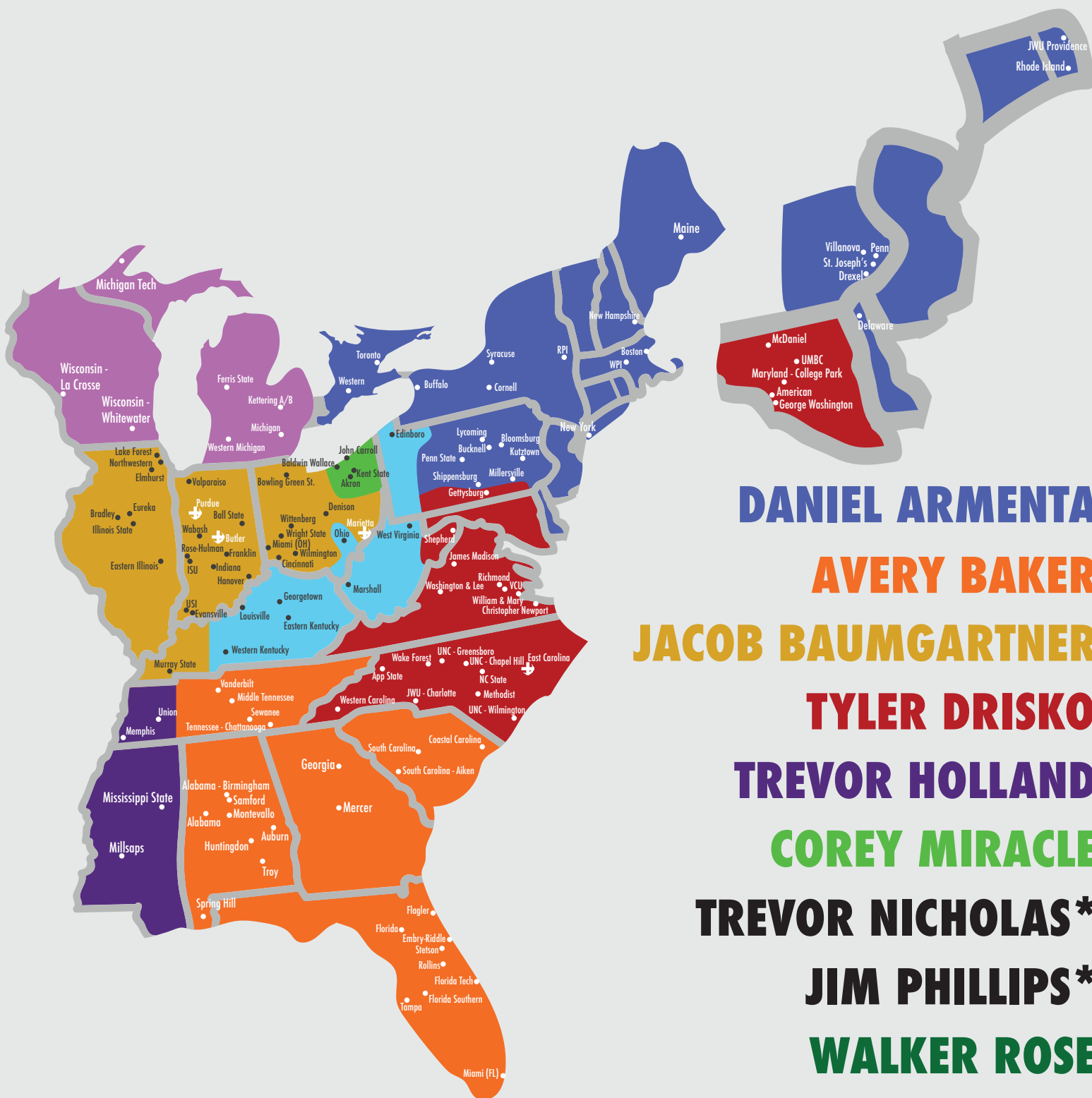
